Words are listed alphabetically with numbers for easy reference (for example assigning ranges by week). Meanings are short guides for revision - encourage your child to put each word into their own sentence.

1. abandon

to leave something behind

Example: The family had to abandon their home due to the flood.

2. abate

to reduce in intensity or amount

Example: The storm began to abate, allowing the sun to shine through.

3. abduct

to take someone away illegally

Example: The detective was determined to prevent anyone from attempting to abduct the child.

4. aberrant

deviating from the norm

Example: The scientist noted the aberrant behavior of the subjects in the experiment.

5. abhorrent

causing strong dislike or hatred

Example: The practices he described were truly abhorrent to the committee members.

6. ablest

most skilled or capable

Example: Among the candidates, she was the ablest and most qualified for the job.

7. abode

a place of residence

Example: After years of travel, she finally returned to her childhood abode.

8. abolish

to formally put an end to something

Example: The government decided to abolish the outdated law to improve equality.

9. abominable

causing moral disgust or hatred

Example: The abominable behavior of the villain shocked everyone involved.

10. abomination

something that is greatly disliked

Example: The pollution in the river was an abomination to the once pristine environment.

11. abrasive

capable of polishing or scraping

Example: The abrasive surface of the sandpaper helped smooth the wood.

12. absence

the state of being away or not present

Example: The absence of evidence made it hard to convict him.

13. absolute

not limited or restricted

Example: The judge made an absolute decision that would affect the entire community.

14. absorbed

deeply engaged or interested in something

Example: She was so absorbed in her book that she lost track of time.

15. abstract

existing in thought, not material

Example: The abstract painting left viewers pondering its meaning.

16. abstruse

difficult to understand

Example: The theories discussed were so abstruse that few could follow them.

17. absurd

ridiculously unreasonable or illogical

Example: The idea of jumping from a plane without a parachute seemed utterly absurd.

18. abundant

existing in large quantities

Example: The garden was abundant with flowers of every color.

19. accessible

able to be reached or entered

Example: The library is accessible to all students after school hours.

20. acclaim

to praise enthusiastically

Example: The author received great acclaim for her latest novel.

21. accolade

an award or praise for achievements

Example: Receiving an accolade for her project motivated her to excel further.

22. accompany

to go along with someone or something

Example: The teacher will accompany the students on their trip to the museum.

23. accumulate

to gather or collect over time

Example: Over the years, she managed to accumulate a vast collection of stamps.

24. accusatory

suggesting someone is guilty

Example: The accusatory tone in her voice made everyone uneasy.

25. accuse

to say someone did something wrong

Example: The teacher decided to accuse the student of cheating after catching him with answers.

26. accustom

to make oneself familiar with something

Example: It took some time for Jessica to accustom herself to the new school environment.

27. acerbic

sharp and forthright in speech

Example: Her acerbic comments during the debate surprised everyone.

28. acquaint

to make someone aware of something

Example: Before the trip, the teacher will acquaint the students with the itinerary.

29. acquiescence

the acceptance of something without protest

Example: Her acquiescence to the plan surprised everyone in the room.

30. acquire

to gain or obtain something

Example: Through hard work and dedication, she hoped to acquire new skills.

31. acrimonious

angry and bitter in tone

Example: The debate turned acrimonious, with both sides exchanging harsh words.

32. acronym

a word formed from initials

Example: NASA is a well-known acronym for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

33. acute

sharp or severe in effect

Example: The doctor noted the acute pain in her side.

34. adamant

refusing to be persuaded

Example: Despite the objections, she remained adamant about her decision to travel alone.

35. address

to speak to someone formally

Example: The teacher decided to address the class about their upcoming project.

36. adept

skilled or proficient at something

Example: Maria is adept at solving complex mathematical problems quickly.

37. adequate

sufficient or suitable for a purpose

Example: The resources provided were adequate for the project's needs.

38. adhere

to stick firmly to a surface

Example: To ensure safety, all students must adhere to the school's guidelines.

39. adherent

a person who supports a particular idea

Example: The adherent passionately explained the importance of the cause.

40. adjacent

next to or adjoining something else

Example: The two houses were adjacent, sharing a common wall.

41. adjourn

to pause a meeting or session

Example: The committee decided to adjourn the meeting until next week.

42. admirable

deserving respect or approval

Example: Her admirable effort in the competition earned her many praises.

43. admission

the process of being allowed entry

Example: Her admission to the prestigious school was a proud moment for her family.

44. admonish

to warn or reprimand someone firmly

Example: The teacher had to admonish Sarah for talking during the lesson.

45. adopt

to take up or start to use

Example: The school decided to adopt a new policy to improve learning.

46. adore

to love deeply and cherish

Example: Many young readers adore the magical stories of fantasy.

47. adulation

excessive admiration or praise

Example: The actor received loud adulation from the audience after the performance.

48. advance

to move forward in position or progress

Example: To succeed in life, one must advance their skills continuously.

49. adversary

a person or group opposing another

Example: In the final match, the champion faced a skilled adversary who pushed him to his limits.

50. adverse

having a negative effect

Example: The adverse weather conditions delayed the outdoor event.

51. adversity

difficulties or misfortunes faced

Example: She showed remarkable strength in the face of adversity during her studies.

52. aesthetic

relating to beauty or art

Example: The gallery showcased an aesthetic blend of modern and classical art.

53. affable

friendly and easy to talk to

Example: The affable host made everyone feel welcome at the party.

54. affectionate

showing warm feelings or love

Example: The affectionate puppy warmed everyone's hearts with its playful nature.

55. affinity

a natural liking or attraction

Example: Her affinity for animals led her to become a vet.

56. affirmation

a positive statement or declaration

Example: Her unwavering affirmation of his talent boosted his confidence greatly.

57. affliction

a state of severe pain or distress

Example: The community rallied together to support those suffering from the affliction.

58. affluent

having a lot of money or wealth

Example: The affluent neighbourhood was filled with luxurious homes and upscale shops.

59. affront

an insult or offense to someone

Example: His rude remarks were seen as an affront to her dignity.

60. aggressive

ready to attack or confront

Example: The aggressive dog barked loudly at the strangers approaching.

61. aggressor

a person who attacks others

Example: The aggressor in the conflict refused to back down, escalating the situation further.

62. aghast

filled with shock or horror

Example: She stood aghast at the sight of the devastation left behind.

63. agnostic

believing the existence of God is unknown

Example: She remained agnostic about the universe's mysteries, preferring to seek evidence.

64. agreeable

pleasant and easy to agree with

Example: The plan for the project was quite agreeable to all members of the team.

65. akin

similar or related in nature

Example: The two paintings were so akin that they could have been created by the same artist.

66. alacrity

eager readiness or willingness

Example: The student approached the exam with alacrity, ready to tackle each question.

67. albeit

although; even if

Example: The movie was entertaining, albeit a bit predictable.

68. alert

watchful and ready for danger

Example: The teacher remained alert during the test to prevent cheating.

69. alienate

to make someone feel isolated

Example: Her harsh words served to alienate her friends rather than bring them closer.

70. allay

to reduce fear or worry

Example: The teacher spoke softly to allay the students' concerns about the exam.

71. allegation

a claim made without proof

Example: The allegation against the politician sparked widespread controversy.

72. alleviate

to make something less severe

Example: The new treatment aims to alleviate the patient's chronic pain.

73. allot

to distribute or assign something

Example: The teacher decided to allot extra time for the project.

74. alluring

charmingly attractive or tempting

Example: The alluring beauty of the sunset captivated everyone at the beach.

75. allusion

an indirect reference to something

Example: The author's allusion to classical mythology enhanced the story's depth.

76. ally

a person or group joined with another

Example: During the project, she proved to be a loyal ally in all discussions.

77. aloof

not friendly or forthcoming

Example: Despite being in a crowd, Sarah remained aloof and kept to herself.

78. altercation

a noisy argument or dispute

Example: The altercation between the two classmates drew the attention of the teacher.

79. altitude

height above sea level

Example: The airplane reached a high altitude as it flew over the mountains.

80. altruistic

showing selfless concern for others

Example: Her altruistic nature led her to volunteer regularly at the local shelter.

81. amateur

a person who engages in a hobby

Example: Despite being an amateur, Clara painted with remarkable skill.

82. ambiguous

having more than one meaning

Example: The teacher's instructions were ambiguous, leaving the students confused.

83. ambition

a strong desire to succeed

Example: Her ambition to become a doctor inspired her studies.

84. ambivalence

having mixed feelings about something

Example: Her ambivalence towards the decision made it difficult to choose a side.

85. amend

to change or improve something

Example: The committee decided to amend the proposal for clarity.

86. amiable

friendly and pleasant in nature

Example: The amiable host made everyone feel welcome at the party.

87. amorphous

having no clear shape or form

Example: The artist created an amorphous sculpture that intrigued the viewers.

88. amphibian

creature living both on land and water

Example: The frog is a well-known amphibian that thrives in wet environments.

89. ample

more than enough in size or amount

Example: The garden provided ample space for the children to play.

90. amusing

entertaining or funny

Example: The comedian's jokes were so amusing that everyone laughed out loud.

91. anagram

a word formed by rearranging letters

Example: Creating an anagram can be a fun word puzzle challenge.

92. analogy

a comparison between two things

Example: The teacher used an analogy to explain the concept more clearly.

93. anarchist

a person who opposes all forms of government

Example: The anarchist believed that society could function without government.

94. ancestral

related to family ancestors

Example: The ancestral home was filled with treasures from generations past.

95. anecdote

a short, amusing story

Example: During the dinner party, she shared an anecdote that had everyone laughing.

96. angst

a feeling of deep anxiety or dread

Example: During the exam, she felt a deep angst about her performance.

97. anguish

severe mental or physical pain

Example: The news of her departure brought him great anguish.

98. animosity

strong hostility or dislike

Example: The animosity between the rival teams intensified throughout the season.

99. antagonistic

showing active opposition or hostility

Example: The antagonistic remarks during the debate led to a heated argument.

100. antidote

a remedy to counteract a poison

Example: The scientist discovered an antidote to the deadly venom.

101. antipathy

a strong feeling of dislike

Example: Her antipathy towards injustice motivated her to campaign for change.

102. antiquated

old-fashioned and no longer useful

Example: The antiquated machinery struggled to keep up with production demands.

103. antiquity

ancient times, especially before the Middle Ages

Example: The artifacts discovered in the ruins date back to antiquity.

104. antithesis

a direct contrast or opposition

Example: In the debate, Sarah argued that the antithesis of freedom is oppression.

105. anxious

feeling worried or nervous

Example: She felt anxious about the upcoming exam results.

106. apathy

lack of interest or enthusiasm

Example: Her apathy towards the project surprised her teachers.

107. aperture

an opening that allows light in

Example: The camera's aperture controls how much light enters the lens.

108. aphorism

a concise statement of a principle

Example: The aphorism 'Actions speak louder than words' is widely recognized.

109. apoplectic

extremely angry or furious

Example: She became apoplectic when she discovered the betrayal.

110. appeal

a request to change a decision

Example: The student's appeal to the teacher was met with understanding.

111. appearance

the way someone or something looks

Example: The appearance of the painting captivated all the visitors in the gallery.

112. appease

to calm or satisfy someone

Example: To appease the angry crowd, the leader promised to address their concerns.

113. appetising

appealing to the taste or smell

Example: The chef's new dish was so appetising that everyone wanted to try it.

114. appreciate

to recognize the full worth of

Example: She truly appreciates the hard work of her teammates on the project.

115. apprehension

anxiety about future events

Example: She felt a sense of apprehension before the exam began.

116. apprehensive

worried about something that might happen

Example: Maria felt apprehensive about the upcoming exam, fearing she might not perform well.

117. apprentice

a person learning a trade or skill

Example: As an apprentice, Sarah eagerly absorbed all the skills from her mentor.

118. apprise

to inform or make aware

Example: The teacher will apprise the students of the changes to the schedule.

119. approve

to agree or accept something

Example: The teacher chose to approve the new school policy after careful consideration.

120. apt

appropriate or suitable in circumstances

Example: Her apt response in the debate impressed the judges.

121. aptitude

natural ability to do something well

Example: Her aptitude for mathematics helped her excel in school.

122. arbitrary

based on random choice

Example: The rules seemed arbitrary and unfair to the students.

123. archaic

outdated or no longer in use

Example: The use of archaic language can make texts harder to understand.

124. architecture

the design and construction of buildings

Example: The architecture of the new library blends modernity with tradition.

125. ardour

intense passion or enthusiasm

Example: Her ardour for reading inspired her classmates to explore literature.

126. arduous

hard to accomplish or achieve

Example: Climbing the mountain proved to be an arduous task for the hikers.

127. argument

a disagreement or debate

Example: The argument between the teams was intense but respectful.

128. arid

extremely dry or lacking moisture

Example: The arid climate made it difficult for plants to grow.

129. arouse

to stimulate or awaken feelings

Example: The heartfelt speech helped to arouse the audience's passion for change.

130. arrogance

exaggerated sense of one's own importance

Example: Her arrogance prevented her from accepting help from others.

131. artefact

an object made by humans, often historic

Example: The museum displayed an ancient artefact that amazed all the visitors.

132. artful

skilled in achieving goals by clever means

Example: The artful negotiator secured a better deal for the company.

133. article

a piece of writing in a publication

Example: The article provided a thorough analysis of climate change.

134. articulate

able to express thoughts clearly

Example: During the debate, Sarah was articulate, making her arguments clear and persuasive.

135. artificial

made by humans, not natural

Example: The artificial flowers looked so realistic that no one could tell they weren't real.

136. artisan

a skilled craftsman

Example: The artisan carefully crafted a unique piece of jewelry.

137. ascendancy

a position of power or influence

Example: The company's ascendancy in the market was impressive and well-earned.

138. ascent

the act of rising to a higher place

Example: The climbers celebrated their ascent to the mountain's peak.

139. ascetic

a person who practices severe self-discipline

Example: The ascetic lived alone in a simple hut, dedicating his life to contemplation.

140. askance

with suspicion or disapproval

Example: The teacher looked askance at the students' excuses for not completing their assignments.

141. aspiration

a hope or ambition to achieve something

Example: Her aspiration to become a doctor inspired her studies in science.

142. aspire

to have a strong desire to achieve

Example: She wants to aspire to be a successful scientist in the future.

143. assemble

to gather things together

Example: In science class, we will assemble the model to understand its structure.

144. assent

to agree or express agreement

Example: The committee reached an assent after much discussion.

145. assertive

confidently expressing one's opinions

Example: In the meeting, Sarah was assertive, clearly stating her thoughts on the project.

146. asset

a valuable person or thing

Example: The new software proved to be a valuable asset for the company.

147. assiduous

showing great care and effort

Example: The assiduous student completed all his assignments on time.

148. assistance

help or support provided to someone

Example: The teacher offered her assistance to students struggling with their work.

149. assortment

a collection of different things

Example: The bakery offered an assortment of pastries for the event.

150. assuage

to make an unpleasant feeling less intense

Example: To assuage her fears, the teacher spoke gently and reassuringly.

151. astonishment

a feeling of great surprise

Example: The audience watched in astonishment as the magician performed his final trick.

152. astounding

causing great surprise or wonder

Example: The magician's astounding tricks left the audience in awe.

153. astute

having an ability to accurately assess situations

Example: Her astute observations during the meeting impressed everyone.

154. asunder

into separate parts or pieces

Example: The storm tore the old house asunder, leaving debris scattered everywhere.

155. atrocious

extremely bad or unpleasant

Example: The weather was atrocious, making it hard to enjoy the hike.

156. attempt

to try to do something

Example: She made an attempt to solve the complex puzzle, showing great perseverance.

157. attentive

paying close attention

Example: The attentive student listened carefully to the teacher's instructions.

158. attribute

a quality or feature of something

Example: The teacher praised her ability to attribute her success to hard work.

159. audacity

boldness or daring, often disrespectful

Example: Her audacity in speaking out impressed the entire class.

160. audition

a trial performance to assess talent

Example: The actress prepared diligently for her audition to impress the casting directors.

161. augment

to make something larger or greater

Example: The new policy aims to augment the resources available for students.

162. auspicious

indicating a good chance of success

Example: The sunny weather made the day feel especially auspicious for their outdoor wedding.

163. austerity

severe restrictions on spending

Example: The government's austerity measures led to widespread protests among citizens.

164. authentic

genuine and true to its origin

Example: The museum displayed an authentic artifact from the ancient civilization.

165. autonomous

self-governing or independent

Example: The autonomous drone flew on its own without human control.

166. average

the typical amount or value

Example: The average score on the test was surprisingly high.

167. aversion

a strong dislike or repugnance

Example: Her aversion to loud noises made concerts quite uncomfortable for her.

168. avoid

to keep away from or prevent

Example: To achieve her goals, she tried to avoid distractions during her studies.

169. avowed

publicly declared or acknowledged

Example: Her avowed ambition to become a scientist inspired her classmates.

170. awe

a feeling of respect and wonder

Example: Standing at the edge of the Grand Canyon, she felt a deep sense of awe.

171. awry

away from the expected or proper direction

Example: The plan went awry when unforeseen challenges arose.

172. axiom

a statement accepted as true without proof

Example: In mathematics, an axiom serves as a starting point for further reasoning.

173. baleful

harmful or threatening

Example: The baleful glare of the storm clouds warned us of impending danger.

174. balk

to hesitate or unwillingly stop

Example: Despite knowing the answer, she chose to balk at speaking up in class.

175. banal

lacking originality, dull

Example: The speaker's banal remarks failed to engage the audience.

176. bane

a source of harm or ruin

Example: For many students, exam stress can be the bane of their year.

177. banish

to send someone away permanently

Example: The ruler decided to banish the traitor from the kingdom forever.

178. barbarian

a person from a primitive culture

Example: In ancient times, the Romans often viewed the barbarian tribes as threats to their empire.

179. bargain

an agreement for a good deal

Example: She managed to bargain effectively for a lower price on the new phone.

180. barren

unable to produce crops or fruit

Example: The barren landscape stretched endlessly, devoid of life.

181. barricade

a structure used to block passage

Example: The protesters built a barricade to prevent traffic from passing.

182. belies

to contradict or show something false

Example: Her calm demeanor belies the anxiety she feels inside.

183. belittle

to make someone or something seem unimportant

Example: She felt hurt when her efforts were belittled by her peers.

184. bellicose

warlike or aggressive in nature

Example: The bellicose statements from the politician raised tensions internationally.

185. belligerent

hostile and aggressive

Example: The belligerent crowd demanded answers from the officials.

186. bemoan

to express sorrow or regret

Example: She began to bemoan the loss of her favorite book during the move.

187. bemuse

to confuse or puzzle someone

Example: The complicated instructions seemed to bemuse the students during the test.

188. benefit

an advantage or profit gained.

Example: Receiving a scholarship can greatly benefit a student's education.

189. benevolent

well-meaning and kindly

Example: The benevolent woman donated generously to the local charity.

190. benign

gentle and kindly in nature

Example: The teacher's benign demeanor made the students feel comfortable asking questions.

191. bequeath

to leave personal belongings to someone

Example: In her will, she chose to bequeath her jewelry to her daughter.

192. bereft

deprived of something lost or absent

Example: After the storm, the garden was left bereft of its flowers.

193. besiege

to surround and attack a place

Example: The army decided to besiege the castle until the enemy surrendered.

194. betray

to be disloyal or reveal secrets

Example: It was the greatest disappointment when she chose to betray her friend's trust.

195. bewildered

confused and unable to think clearly

Example: She felt bewildered by the sudden change in plans.

196. biased

unfairly supporting one side

Example: The article appeared biased, as it only presented one viewpoint.

197. bickering

arguing about petty matters

Example: The siblings were bickering over who would use the computer first.

198. biodiversity

variety of life in a habitat

Example: The rainforest's biodiversity is crucial for maintaining ecological balance.

199. bipartisan

supported by two political parties

Example: The bipartisan agreement helped to pass the new law effectively.

200. bland

lacking strong flavor or character

Example: The soup was so bland that I added spices to enhance its taste.

201. blasphemy

disrespecting sacred beliefs

Example: The teacher explained that blasphemy can lead to severe consequences in many cultures.

202. bleak

cold and lacking in warmth or comfort

Example: The bleak landscape made her feel lonely and isolated.

203. blissful

extremely happy and full of joy

Example: The family enjoyed a blissful day at the beach, filled with laughter and sunshine.

204. boastful

showing pride in oneself

Example: His boastful nature often alienated his friends.

205. boisterous

noisy, energetic, and cheerful

Example: The boisterous crowd cheered enthusiastically at the concert.

206. bolster

to support or strengthen something

Example: The teacher aimed to bolster her students' confidence during the exam preparation.

207. boon

a beneficial thing or blessing

Example: The new park has been a great boon to the community.

208. braggart

a person who boasts excessively

Example: The braggart couldn't resist showing off his latest achievements.

209. brawn

physical strength or muscular power

Example: His brawn was evident as he easily lifted the heavy weights.

210. brazen

bold and without shame

Example: The brazen thief stole from the crowded market without fear.

211. breach

an act of breaking a law or agreement

Example: The company faced severe consequences for the breach of contract.

212. breadth

the distance or extent of something

Example: The breadth of knowledge required for the exam was impressive.

213. brevity

the quality of being brief

Example: The brevity of her speech impressed the audience significantly.

214. brief

lasting for a short time

Example: The teacher gave a brief explanation before the test.

215. brisk

quick and energetic in movement

Example: The brisk wind made the autumn leaves dance in the air.

216. brooding

deeply thoughtful in a sad way

Example: In the quiet corner of the room, she sat brooding over her lost opportunity.

217. bruise

an injury causing discoloration

Example: After the fall, she had a deep bruise on her leg.

218. brusque

abrupt or blunt in manner

Example: Her brusque response left everyone in the room surprised.

219. bulky

large and difficult to handle

Example: The bulky package was hard to carry up the stairs.

220. burden

a heavy load or responsibility

Example: The burden of his responsibilities weighed heavily on him.

221. burgeon

to grow or develop rapidly

Example: As spring approached, the garden began to burgeon with vibrant flowers.

222. bustling

lively and full of activity

Example: The bustling market was filled with cheerful shoppers and vibrant vendors.

223. buttress

a support for a wall or structure

Example: The ancient cathedral had a massive buttress to ensure its stability.

224. cache

a hidden storage for data

Example: The computer's cache makes programs load much faster.

225. cacophony

a harsh, discordant mixture of sounds

Example: The cacophony of the city made it hard to concentrate on her studies.

226. cajole

to persuade through flattery

Example: She tried to cajole her parents into letting her stay out late.

227. calamity

a disaster causing great damage

Example: The flood was a calamity that affected many families in the town.

228. callous

showing no sympathy or feeling

Example: Her callous remarks about his failure hurt him deeply.

229. callow

inexperienced and immature

Example: The callow young man struggled to navigate the complexities of adult life.

230. calm

free from excitement or anger

Example: The lake was calm, reflecting the clear sky above.

231. campaign

a planned series of activities

Example: The local community organized a campaign to improve the environment.

232. candid

truthful and straightforward

Example: The teacher appreciated her candid feedback about the project.

233. candidate

a person being considered for a position

Example: The candidate presented a strong argument for her proposal during the debate.

234. candour

the quality of being open and honest

Example: Her candour about the project's challenges impressed the entire team.

235. canopy

an overhead covering of foliage

Example: The forest's canopy filtered the sunlight, creating a tranquil atmosphere.

236. cantankerous

bad-tempered and uncooperative

Example: The cantankerous old man often scolded children for playing near his garden.

237. capricious

given to sudden changes in mood

Example: The capricious weather made planning the picnic difficult.

238. careering

moving swiftly and uncontrollably

Example: The car was careering down the icy road, making everyone nervous.

239. caricature

a comic exaggeration of a person

Example: The artist's caricature made the politician look ridiculous yet funny.

240. catastrophe

a sudden disaster or event causing great damage

Example: Her love for him remained unrequited, leaving her heartbroken.

1725. unrestricted

not limited or controlled

Example: The unrestricted access to the library allowed all students to explore various subjects.

1726. unscrupulous

having no moral principles

Example: The unscrupulous businessman deceived his clients for profit.

1727. unsurpassed

better than anything else

Example: Her unsurpassed talent in art captivated the entire audience.

1728. untoward

unexpected and inappropriate

Example: The untoward incident caused a stir at the event.

1729. unwarranted

not justified or necessary

Example: The teacher considered her criticism to be unwarranted and unhelpful.

1730. unwitting

not knowing or aware

Example: The unwitting participant had no idea about the surprise.

1731. unworthy

not deserving respect or attention

Example: She felt unworthy of the prestigious award she received.

1732. urbanisation

the process of cities developing

Example: Urbanisation has led to significant changes in local environments.

1733. usurp

to take power or control unlawfully

Example: The ambitious leader sought to usurp the throne from the rightful king.

1734. utterance

a spoken statement or remark

Example: During the debate, her utterance caught everyone's attention.

1735. vacant

not occupied or filled

Example: The vacant house stood silently at the end of the street.

1736. vacillate

to waver between choices

Example: During the meeting, Sarah began to vacillate between two different plans.

1737. vacuous

lacking intelligence or ideas

Example: Her vacuous remarks during the discussion proved she hadn't listened.

1738. vague

not clear or definite

Example: Her explanation was so vague that I couldn't understand the details.

1739. vain

having an excessively high opinion of oneself

Example: Despite his many achievements, his vain attitude alienated his friends.

1740. valid

legally or logically acceptable

Example: The contract was deemed valid after thorough review by the lawyer.

1741. vanish

to disappear suddenly or completely

Example: As the sun set over the horizon, the light began to vanish from the sky.

1742. vapid

lacking flavor or interest

Example: The movie was so vapid that I regretted watching it.

1743. vapour

a gas that is visible in the air

Example: The vapour rising from the tea created a warm atmosphere in the room.

1744. vast

extremely large in size or amount

Example: The vast desert stretched endlessly towards the horizon.

1745. venerable

worthy of respect due to age

Example: The venerable professor was admired for his decades of knowledge and experience.

1746. ventilation

the process of supplying fresh air

Example: Good ventilation is essential in crowded rooms to maintain comfort.

1747. veracity

conformity to facts; accuracy

Example: The lawyer questioned the veracity of the witness's statement during the trial.

1748. verbose

using too many words

Example: The professor's verbose explanation confused many students during the lecture.

1749. verify

to confirm the truth of something

Example: The scientist managed to verify her research findings through extensive testing.

1750. veritable

genuine or real; authentic

Example: The museum displayed a veritable collection of ancient artifacts.

1751. vernacular

the language spoken by ordinary people

Example: The author's use of vernacular added authenticity to the characters' dialogue.

1752. versatile

able to adapt to many functions

Example: The versatile tool was perfect for every task in the workshop.

1753. vessel

a container for holding liquids

Example: The artist filled the glass vessel with vibrant paint.

1754. vex

to annoy or frustrate someone

Example: The loud noise from the construction site began to vex the residents nearby.

1755. viable

capable of working successfully

Example: The team's proposal was innovative and viable for implementation.

1756. vicarious

experienced through another person

Example: She felt a vicarious thrill watching her friend win the race.

1757. vice

a moral fault or weakness

Example: He struggled to overcome his vice, which affected his studies.

1758. vicinity

the area near a particular place

Example: The park is located in the vicinity of my house.

1759. vigilant

keeping careful watch for danger

Example: The vigilant lifeguard noticed the swimmer in trouble and quickly reacted.

1760. vigorously

with great energy and strength

Example: The team worked vigorously to complete the project ahead of schedule.

1761. vigour

physical strength and good health

Example: The athlete trained with great vigour to prepare for the competition.

1762. vilify

to speak ill of someone or something

Example: He tried to vilify her reputation with false accusations.

1763. vindicate

to clear someone of blame

Example: The new evidence served to vindicate her claims of innocence.

1764. vindictive

having a strong desire for revenge

Example: Her vindictive nature led her to seek revenge on those who wronged her.

1765. virtue

a good moral quality or trait

Example: Her kindness and honesty are true virtues that inspire others.

1766. virtuous

having high moral standards

Example: The virtuous leader inspired many with her integrity and honesty.

1767. viscous

thick and sticky in consistency

Example: The viscous syrup slowly poured from the bottle.

1768. visionary

having imaginative ideas about the future

Example: The visionary leader inspired his team with innovative ideas.

1769. vitriolic

harshly critical or sarcastic

Example: The vitriolic comments in the debate shocked everyone present.

1770. vivacious

full of life and energy

Example: The vivacious girl lit up the room with her laughter.

1771. vivid

producing powerful feelings or strong images

Example: The artist used vivid colors to bring the painting to life.

1772. vocation

a person's job or profession

Example: Determined to follow her vocation, Emma pursued a career in teaching.

1773. vociferous

making a loud, noisy outcry

Example: The vociferous crowd at the concert cheered for their favourite band.

1774. volatile

likely to change rapidly and unpredictably

Example: The stock market can be quite volatile, often swinging dramatically in one day.

1775. voluminous

large in size or quantity

Example: The library had voluminous shelves filled with books from all over the world.

1776. voracious

having a great appetite for something

Example: The voracious reader finished three books in one weekend.

1777. vow

a serious promise or commitment

Example: She made a vow to help others throughout her life.

1778. waive

to give up a right or claim

Example: She decided to waive her right to a refund.

1779. wanton

deliberate and unrestrained action

Example: The wanton destruction of the building left the town in shock.

1780. wary

cautious about potential dangers

Example: She was wary of strangers approaching her in the park.

1781. wasteful

using more than necessary

Example: Her wasteful spending on luxury items raised concerns among her friends.

1782. weary

feeling tired or exhausted

Example: After studying for hours, Emily felt weary and needed a break.

1783. whimsical

playfully quaint or fanciful

Example: The whimsical decorations in her room made it feel like a fairy tale.

1784. whining

making a high-pitched complaining sound

Example: The dog's whining became unbearable during the storm.

1785. wholesome

promoting health or moral well-being

Example: The wholesome meal made everyone feel energized and happy.

1786. wilful

deliberately determined to behave

Example: Her wilful refusal to listen caused frustration among her teachers.

1787. willpower

the ability to control oneself

Example: With strong willpower, she managed to resist the dessert temptation.

1788. winsome

charmingly attractive or pleasing

Example: The winsome smile of the child brought joy to everyone around.

1789. wistful

having a feeling of yearning or regret

Example: She gazed wistfully out the window, reminiscing about her childhood.

1790. wither

to become dry and shriveled

Example: Without water, the plants began to wither under the hot sun.

1791. woeful

expressing strong distress or regret

Example: The woeful state of the old building saddened many onlookers.

1792. worthy

having value or merit

Example: The charity made a worthy contribution to the community.

1793. wretch

a miserable or unfortunate person

Example: Despite his wealth, he often felt like a wretch when alone.

1794. yearn

to desire strongly or intensely

Example: She would often yearn for the days spent by the seaside.

1795. yield

to produce or provide something

Example: Farmers hope their crops will yield a bountiful harvest this year.

1796. yonder

that place over there

Example: The mountains yonder are covered in snow during winter.

1797. zeal

great enthusiasm for a cause

Example: Her zeal for reading inspired others to join the book club.

1798. zenith

the highest point or peak

Example: The explorer reached the zenith of the mountain after a challenging climb.

1799. zephyr

a gentle, mild breeze

Example: The zephyr swept through the trees, bringing a refreshing calmness.

1800. zestful

full of energy and enthusiasm

Example: Her zestful approach to learning inspired her classmates.
